In today's regulatory environment, the operation of a water treatment facility is more challenging than ever before. Recently, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) imposed additional testing requirements for the nation's drinking water systems which will require UBT's water treatment plant personnel to collect more samples and conduct additional tests on UBT's drinking water. According to John Tate, Manager of UBT's Water Treatment Plant, as a result of these new regulations, "UBT will be required to spend significantly more money on testing, but the benefits of this testing far outweigh the costs. No one can put a price tag on ensuring that the water supply for our customers is safe to drink."

In 2004 alone, there were an estimated 115,000 work zone crashes in the U.S., some of which resulted in serious injury and even death.

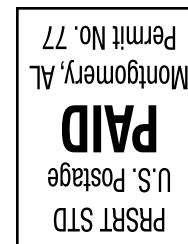

- Follow the directions and signals of the work area traffic director.
- Never enter a work area – only authorized UBT employees or their affiliates are allowed on work sites.

Adhering to these basic steps can help prevent accidents and assist UBT in maintaining safe work zones for everyone involved.

UBT Launches New Utility Theft and Tip Hotline

Meter tampering and theft of utility services are growing problems in our service area. These are illegal acts that not only result in increased costs for our honest customers, but also present potential safety hazards for our employees and the public at large. At UBT, we investigate each incident and vigorously pursue action, including criminal prosecution, against anyone found to be tampering with a utility meter or stealing utility services.

In order to assist in combating this problem, we have established a Tip-Line that customers can use to report suspected utility theft, meter tampering, and other possibly inappropriate or suspicious activity. If you suspect any such activity, we ask that you call 334-720-0778 and report it to our Tip-Line. All tips are anonymous and confidential.

By calling the Tip-Line, you can assist UBT in discovering and stopping this type of illegal activity.

Electric - Keeping You Connected!!



For the seventh consecutive month, UBT has achieved an Average Service Availability Rating of 99.99%. This means that, during this period, electric service was on and available 99.99% of the time. According to Mark Ennis, General Manager of UBT, "Providing reliable electric service continues to be our top priority. We are pleased to have achieved this level of reliability for the seventh consecutive month."

In the past, a common complaint of UBT's customers was that the lights went off "every time the wind blew". In order to address this problem, UBT began aggressive efforts to improve the reliability of its electric service. These efforts included making extensive upgrades to the electric system and instituting an aggressive tree-trimming and right-of-way maintenance program. These efforts have paid off and have allowed UBT to make great strides in delivering the reliable service that our customers deserve.

According to Ennis, "Not only is reliable electric service a quality of life issue for our customers, it is also an economic development issue for Macon County. No one wants their power going off 'every time the wind blows', especially businesses and industries. In the past, our competitors used our poor reliability against us. However, now that we have achieved this high level of reliability, not only have we made Macon County more attractive to business and industry, but we also can use it as a selling point for our community."

At UBT, we understand that quality utility services are essential to the growth and development of Macon County. We will continue to strive daily to ensure that our utility systems are ready and able to support the growth that is anticipated in the communities we serve.

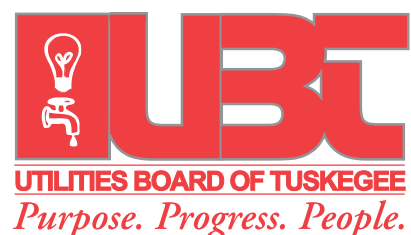
Conserving Energy During the Summer Months

- Look for ENERGY STAR qualified products. There are more than 40 product categories, including lighting and home appliances.
- Get an attic fan. An attic fan will circulate air in your attic to help keep your home cooler. Your air-conditioning won't have to work so hard, and your energy usage will be lower.
- Cool smartly. Have your cooling equipment serviced annually and remember to replace air filters regularly. Use a programmable thermostat and when it's time to replace old equipment, look for an ENERGY STAR qualified model.
- Change five lights. Completely replace your five most frequently used lights or the bulbs in them with ones that have earned the ENERGY STAR seal.
- Seal up your home. Seal air leaks, add insulation, and choose ENERGY STAR qualified windows.
- Tell family and friends. Help spread the word that energy efficiency is good for your home and good for our environment.
